


JONATHAN'S IMPACT ORPHAN MINISTRIES

Jonathan's Impact was started after the death of our 17 year old son Jonathan due to a cancerous brain tumor. When ill, Jonathan chose to use his wish, granted through the Make a Wish Foundation, to provide an irrigation system for an orphanage in Harare, Zimbabwe. Since the irrigation system was installed, that orphanage has closed. However, the system has been moved to irrigate the fields in which crops are now planted for the Chileleko Home. Jonathan's wish is still being used to provide for orphans today.



# Organizational Goals

## Hands of Hope

- Will no longer purchase homes in which to house orphans. Plans are being developed this year for a foster care model for future orphan care.
- Is engaged in agricultural projects to develop financial self-sufficiency for the HOH - Africa
- Is developing center at Habitation of Hope in which orphans served by the ministry can develop occupational skills

## Jonathan's Impact Orphan Ministries

- To provide for the care of each orphan in the home while simultaneously investing in agricultural projects through Global Life Foundation to develop self-sufficiency for Chileleko Home. The goal is to gradually wean our financial support as the home becomes self-sufficient.
- To provide for the post secondary education for each child in the home, as well as work with Global Life Foundation to provide an optimal aging out plan for each child.
- Consult and plan with Hands of Hope on our participation in their foster care initiative, especially for the children of Chileleko.

# Accomplishments This Mission Trip

- Met with the Chileleko Home Board and made budgetary modifications for 2018 to account for the unexpected lack of revenue from the agricultural projects.
- Visited Beatrice farms to obtain visual update on agricultural production for crops which are to be harvested in the remainder 2018.
- Delivered the sponsor letters to the children and assisted them to write return letters.
- Delivered gifts of new spring dresses to the girls, dressy outfits for the boys, shirts and dresses from Dresses for Orphans, and pajamas for the children.
- Provided funds to repair the car used for the home, as well as the washing machine.
- Delivered pictures and scrapbook materials to the children. Helped them to continue making the scrapbooks that they started for themselves.

# CHIPO

Chipo, who is about 22 months old, arrived at Chileleko through the social services department in the spring of 2017. She had been abandoned on the doorstep of a stranger. She is now a happy toddler who is walking and beginning to talk.




# Shamma

Shamma, who is roughly 20 months old, came to Chileleko about a year ago after being nursed back to health in a hospital. She has a serious illness and takes daily medications. She is walking and beginning to talk.



# Nyasha

Nyasha arrived at Chileleko about 15 months ago after being found on the street, barely breathing and near death. Upon his arrival at Chileleko, he had severe kwashiorkor and rickets. He could not walk and used to drag himself across the floor. Now, at 2 years old, he no longer has kwashiorkor and can now walk. He has a gregarious personality and loves to eat.



# TAWANANYASHA

Tawananyasha arrived at the Chileleko Home the week of July 18, 2018. He is approximately four years old. He had been abandoned at his home by his mother. A neighbor took him into her home, hoping that his mother would return, but she did not. After 3 months, the neighbor reported the situation to police, who placed him with Social Welfare. Tawananyasha is very emaciated and was reported by the neighbor caring for him to be unable to talk. He now says a few words.



# CHIPO

Five year old Chipo came to Chileleko in January of 2014. She is an only child whose mother passed away on December 23, 2013. Her father has been imprisoned. She has just started kindergarten.



## KUZILEZA

Seven year old Kuzileza came to Chileleko four years ago from the rural area of Binga. He is the youngest child in a family of four and was being raised by his grandmother, who could no longer care for him. Due to extreme poverty, Kuzileza was extremely malnourished and had developed rickets prior to his arrival. Now, however, his legs have straightened because of the proper nutrition and medical care being provided at Chileleko.



# BRIGHT

Bright, age 8, was brought to the Chileleko Home in 2012. Prior to his arrival, both of his parents had died and he was living with his grandmother. Because of her extreme poverty, he was undernourished and had developed rickets. After living at Chileleko for the past 5.5 years, he is well nourished and thriving. He has a beautiful singing voice and has been unwavering in his stated desire to be a pastor.




# TARISAI

Eleven year old Tarisai was brought to Chileleko four years ago after she was found wandering in the streets by the police. She was malnourished and underweight when found. No family has yet been located for her. She has adjusted well to the Chileleko Home and is a bright, friendly, and helpful child.



## ELLA

Thirteen year old Ella came to Chileleko in 2013. Her mother died and her father remarried, but he did not take Ella into his new family. Ella had never been to school before her arrival at Chileleko, but she is now doing well academically. She has special medical needs and takes daily medication.



# PROGRESS

Progress, age 19, is awaiting receipt of her birth certificate and identification cards from social services before she can exit the home. The exit plan is for her to live with Lucia's sister. Progress completed her braiding internship at a hair salon, but was unable to generate business due to her hearing impairment. We are presently researching a variety of options for her, including attendance at the Harare School for the Deaf and getting a job as a caretaker at Chileleko. (Social Services is against the idea of orphans staying at the homes after adulthood, but an exception to this rule is being sought because of her disability.

# Report on Revenue Producing Projects

- Jonathan's Impact invested \$3700 in 2017 to begin revenue producing projects to move Chileleko towards self-sufficiency.
- January 2018: Predicted crop revenue roughly \$1000. Actual revenue \$300
- February - July: No revenue due to crop failures, though \$3100 in revenues were projected
- August to December: Projected revenues are \$12,500 or \$2500 per month. Thus far, projections have been falsely high, but we are hopeful.
- Reasons for crop failures in 2018: Tonderai is an educated agronomist, but is new at these types of projects. Also, lack of reliability of hired help has been a significant factor. These problems have been addressed by getting an experienced advisor, hiring new staff, and provision of supervision by Chileleko Home Board.



## Rabbit, Chicken Projects, and Chileleko Crops

Rabbits, chickens, eggs, and crops from the home garden are being used to supplement the diet of the children at the home.



