2020 – A YEAR OF BREAKTHROUGHS FOR SHAMMAH HOUSE

While 2020 has been a disheartening year in many ways for much of the world, it has been a year of breakthroughs for Jonathan's Impact and the orphans of Shammah House. The extreme poverty of most of the Zimbabwean church members who are affiliated with Shammah House and the lengthy respiratory illness and hospitalization of the home director Abel Malate in 2020 have placed the financial condition of Shammah House in a difficult place. Prior to his illness this year, Abel Malate was paying for much of the education for the children of the home by doing electrical work for the children's school in exchange for tuition payments. Even with his efforts, the tuition payments were in arrears, even though some payments were being made. Now, however, Abel is unable to do this work because of his health. His fellow church members are unable to assist with support of the home because they are struggling to feed their own families. The Covid -19 virus has had a severe negative impact on the already flailing Zimbabwean economy. After focused prayer and unanimous agreement among all of the Jonathan's Impact board members, Jonathan's Impact has agreed to assume responsibility for 97% of the Shammah House budget this year.

In addition to providing most of the budgets for Shammah House and the Chileleko Home, the board of Jonathan's Impact has recognized and responded to the need for an aging out plan for Shammah House. (An aging out and savings plan had already been made for the Chileleko Home in prior years.) Shammah House, which houses 20 children, has 6 adolescents who are aging out of the home this year. Jonathan's Impact has agreed to provide, funds permitting, post-secondary education for the children of the homes, be it university, college, or trade school. Jonathan's Impact will also provide a laptop computer and data plan for the students who go to college or university. Shammah House and the Chileleko Home will contribute to the aging out plan by providing continued housing for the young adults, whether it is at their present home or at the foster home of a church member. They will also provide most of the transportation costs and daily meals for the students. To participate in this plan, the students must be law abiding, follow the rules of the homes and make passing grades. We believe that post high school education is absolutely essential for these young adults to have a chance of financial survival. The cost for the aging out program this upcoming year alone is projected to be \$9,000.

Your new and continued support of the orphans of Shammah House and the Chileleko Home is very much needed. Conald and Lucia Dandahuni, directors of the Chileleko Home, and Abel and Swemmer Malate, directors of Shammah House, have followed the heart of God, who describes Himself as a "Father to the fatherless and defender of widows," in their care of orphans. Jonathan's Impact is humbly grateful to join them in their sacrificial giving.

CURRENT ISSUES IN ZIMBABWE

According to a press release in late October 2020, Zimbabwe expects its average annual inflation to slow to 134% in 2020, according to a finance ministry document published on Friday, more than halving the central bank's previous forecast. Of course, government forecasts are overly optimistic! The country is grappling with its worst economic crisis in more than a decade, with runaway inflation of 659.4% year-on-year in September, and severe shortages of foreign currency, food, and medicine.
